What's More Sustainable: Real or fake Christmas trees? - There has been much debate over which Christmas tradition is more sustainable- cut Christmas trees or fake Christmas trees. Many in support of cut trees balk at the use of synthetics (oil) to create a replica of something natural. While on the other side, fake Christmas tree groups nearly faint at the sight of a perfectly good evergreen being chopped down. So what does the research say?

<u>Christmas Tree Selection</u> - If you go the cut tree route when choosing a tree, ideally you want something that has a good shape, color, and branch distribution. It is also important that the tree has good needle retention to last the entire Christmas season.
