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Situation:


The equine industry in Georgia, as well as Newton County, has grown in scope over the last decade. The total Equine Farm Gate value in Newton County is over \$9 million. Information gathered by horse owners is from local feed stores, farriers and other members of the equine community and is often not research-based or accurate. This information can be out-of-date, ineffective and more commonly opinion-based. Previous equine programming from Extension has been targeted towards 4-H youth thus adult education has been minimal. Newton County Extension has met the needs of the equine community for research-based information by providing virtual programming, in-person courses, a quarterly equine newsletter, site visits and work to promote and improve equine activities at the local Newton County Agriculture Center.

The purpose of "The Leading Rein" is to provide equine owners timely, research-based, and unbiased information about general equine ownership and has rotating articles on forage management, reproduction, nutrition, and 4–H horse programs for youth. Two permanent segments include the "Tack Corner", which is a discussion of tack and equipment, and the "Mark Your Calendar", a list of upcoming events and trainings through brief explanations and clickable links to register or learn more. 

The Newton County Agriculture Center Committee Work

The Newton County Extension Agent serves on the advisory committee and works closely with the Newton County Agriculture Center Manager to improve the equine activities and usage of the horse arena.

- Aided in securing a Department of Community Affairs Grant of \$600,000 to build an 80 stall horse barn
- Advised the expansion of the warm up arena
- Usage has increased to an average of 4 events per month renting the facilities
- Secured improvements in the footing for performance equine events
